Things to remember!


The letter j is never used for the /j/ sound at the end of words. At the end of a word, the sound is spelt -dge straight after the /a/, /e/, /i/, /o/, /o/ and /o/

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
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Words that start with the phoneme /n/ are sometimes spelt with the digraph 'kn'.

gnome




knee - the middle part of your leg that lets it bend



knitting - making something with 2 long needles and wool




knife - a sharp tool used for cutting up food
